

What I've been up to this month:

On 2nd September I travelled to the Lavant sewage plant with representatives from the Lavant, West Dean, Singleton and East Dean Parish Councils. We were given a very smelly tour of the work that Southern are doing to improve the capacity of the plant to reduce the number of sewage spills into the river. It was a very interesting tour and the use of the nature-based solutions that have been successfully used previously in France and by Severn-Trent is fascinating. It was also disappointing to hear that the Environment Agency is requiring them to engage in a trial despite the evidence of thirty years of Severn-Trent using it. This five-year trial will hopefully show that the wetland system they've installed work to ensure Southern are better able to handle storm overflows and stop damaging our river's ecosystem. They are waiting for an update on their license so that they can use the full capacity of the plant (which has been more than doubled) to allow them to treat more sewage and reduce the amount of waste they pump into the river. Sadly, the system doesn't remove the phosphates that are one of the main causes of algal blooms in the river that damage the wildlife in the river. The ecologist on site explained how they couldn't use standard anti-phosphate methods like using iron because otherwise they would create a huge rusty brown streak down the river, which no-one wants. They are waiting for approval to try another method, while I hope the new system will work, I do have my suspicions because we've been dealing with this for a long time now. When I was learning to sail at about age nine, my father would refuse to let me go out after it had rained because it was well known even then that they were dumping sewage into the harbour. I want to finish this section by thanking those of you who engage in water testing in the Lavant, so we have independent evidence for what they're doing to the unique habitat that is the chalk winterbourne.

On 3rd September I attended the City Council's community affairs committee and heard about how the Jam Café on South Street have started a new youth redirect service to try and keep children at risk of criminality away from anti-social behaviour, I found the entire thing fascinating as this is something I deal with in my work life with children in care. I would strongly encourage anyone with an interest in helping in that kind of area to contact them and see whether they need any help. It very much showed to me the need for third places, where children can hang out with their friends without the expectation of spending money or of being moved along by the police when they are accused of being suspicious. We also heard about the successes this year from the Festival of Chichester and Chichester Fringe about how the grants provided to them by the city have helped them grow as organisations, it's good to see our city develop its own unique cultural scene, something which was definitely less prominent when I was a child.

On 5th September I attended the City Council's 800th anniversary mediaeval market, it was an excellent event with highly knowledgeable craftspeople showing off their crafts, I discovered I was secretly very interested in the processing of flax into linen and medieval dying. It was brilliant to see so many people of all ages enjoying themselves, and there was even a jeweller who had previously worked on the Lord of the Rings and Game of Thrones as he's one of the few remaining traditional jewellers who work entirely by hand. I hope the event becomes a regular event because it's certainly

unique, especially since the Weald and Downland stopped doing their traditional crafts fair before the pandemic.

Amusingly on 8th September an event to demonstrate highway's weather readiness plans to councillors had to be cancelled due to poor weather. I believe that is called irony.

On that day instead we had a presentation and meet and greet with the Highways team and discussed the problems they face and their use of new technology (e.g. AI pothole detection for inspection vehicles and new, tougher materials to replace the old surfaces, allowing them to take heavier modern vehicles without breaking) to face the problems we see in West Sussex (e.g. worsening weather, heavier vehicles, increased traffic, aging infrastructure, overstretched budgets, inflation etc). It was very interesting, especially to hear about how the contractors have a new risk assessment program that mean the risk assessment now only takes a matter of seconds at the beginning of the job. The council also inspects about 10% of pothole repairs, and they're guaranteed for a year, while the repair work done by the utilities companies are guaranteed to last for two years (please let us know if either of them fails within that time). Modern data collection means that we know down to the second when a repair was completed. Highways are looking at ways to bring back the pothole reporting app that was previously discontinued.

On 9th September I attended the Children's and Young People's services scrutiny committee. We scrutinised the council's services and how they're planning to improve them to hit their targets. One of the most exciting was that WSCC has managed to improve its dismal level of SEND completion from the mid to low teens to 31% completed on time in August. This is still unacceptably low, but a massive improvement from where it has been previously, it remains an area the CYPSSC will keep a close eye on. In news about one of my local schools, we were informed that the increase in capacity for St Anthony's is still on course to be ready on schedule, delays remain unfortunately for the expansion of Fordwater school owing to legal disputes.

We also heard about the county's adult learning programme, which is very impressive with a pass rate of well over 90% for their learners, they also clarified how the new combined authority would work in respect to the devolved authority around adult education, previously we were led to believe it would be taken over by the combined authority entirely, it has now been clarified that the service part will remain with us while the funding is being taken out of Westminster and handed over to the combined authority, which will make it easier for the adult education service to be more reactive to the skills needed by Sussex.

Finally, we looked at the new Youth Strategy for West Sussex, which is about to go out to consultation. I strongly suggest that anyone who works with young people read the new strategy and take part in the consultation and get as many groups involved as possible, we want to make the county a much better place for young people to live. We are currently facing a problem of youth boredom that we need to manage, and the youth strategy needs to reflect this. The youth boredom is the cause behind much of the

anti-social behaviour we see. We also need to tackle the issue of e-scooters and e-bikes. I'm personally of the opinion that their usage is due to the unreliable and infrequent buses that we have in the area. On 11th September I attended my first meeting of Standing Advisory Committee on Religious Education, meeting faith leaders and RE teachers from across the county as we discussed the County's new RE syllabus (which you can read on our website) and how we can make it work for all schools. We also noted that the week of 8th-15th November is national interfaith week and we are trying to think of ways to promote it in schools, I suggested promoting learning to make religiously important food, as a lot of worship includes food or communal meals for special occasions or with symbolic meanings (e.g. Challah for Judaism, Halva for Islam, Hot Cross Buns for Anglicanism, Modak for Hinduism etc), because the way to someone's heart is often via the stomach and it helps people to learn when they have something solid in their hands to show for it. Religious education is often forgotten about, but with the amount of misinformation running around about religion, it's an important aspect of our community education and can contribute to community cohesion and social harmony. We are looking at ways we can make more resources that are not just worksheets. The future of SACREs (every council has one) is unknown because the government is currently considering plans for the future of religious education and we won't know what that looks like for a while yet.

On 15th September at Westhampnett Parish Council I was delighted to hear that Rolls-Royce's second car park is now open, this has noticeably reduced the stationary traffic that used to plague the village from about 13:45 to about 15:00 every single day during the shift change. I heard this time and again as a bug bear of the public all through my division, with people getting caught in it either entering or exiting Chichester or getting to and from Sainsbury's. This second car park was a planning requirement put on the application for Rolls-Royce's factory extension due to the planning committee understanding the frustration that it causes local residents. It has not completely solved the issue, but it has mitigated the problem.

As previously mentioned, I was away 18th-22nd September but I was right back in it on the 23rd when I attended the University of Chichester Fresher's Fair to support Jess Brown-Fuller, MP for Chichester as she greeted the new students. That evening I then attended the Chichester and District Cycle Forum to discuss the needs of active transport in the area, along with gaps in the network and the continued issues of inconsiderate drivers (including hit and runs). We also discussed the viability of a potential bike bus for Luffa and Parklands schools.

Also:

On the 25th of August before the Fire Service talk, I took a walk around the village to deliver leaflets, while I was doing that I made a note of matters to send to highways. I've

sent a request to get the triangles outside the village hall in Singleton and next to the war memorial in Charlton repaired as their stones have come loose and the Charlton one is missing several. I also filed requests for the rangers to deal with the overgrown 20 mph sign at the western entrance to Singleton and the direction sign at the northern entrance. I also requested the hedge around the 20 mph at the entrance to Charlton to be trimmed back, and for the tree overhanging the path by bankside to be trimmed back.

At your parish chair's request several months ago I asked highways to check on the state of Town Lane, they checked it and agreed that it needed patching, I have been told that this has now reached the front of the queue and as soon as they can organise a road closure there's going to be the big patching machine coming up to patch 74m of road (maybe by the time I send this it will have already happened). This is the second large stretch of road around Singleton where the parish chair and I have worked together like this, as another section on Bankside was done near the river.

Footpath 3013 (north of Singleton) is to be closed until mid-November, this is to enable works for engineer works for the Singleton-Cocking extension of Centurion Way.

OFSTED has performed their Inspection of Local Authority Children's Services, I hope that our officers won't find this too stressful and that the report comes back positive, we expect that report in November, the report and the improvement plan for it will be scrutinised at the January meeting of the Children and Young People's Service Scrutiny Committee (CYPSSC). The report for the SEND reform plans, which would have covered the vast majority of the enormous SEND deficit built up by SEND demand outpacing the Discretionary Schools Grant has been delayed to some point in the next few weeks, this isn't entirely unexpected because it was always a very ambitious timetable from the central government. We remain confident that our plans will be sufficient to receive the funding to cover the deficit.

The CYPSSC has decided the topics for our next two meetings, the November meeting will see us scrutinising the Quarterly Performance and Resources Report on our KPIs, along with the Youth Justice Service, Early Years Provision and any urgent matters related to the budget. January will see us scrutinise the response to the OFSTED report I already mentioned, as well as our final Youth Strategy and our Psychology Hub (which provides mental health support for children and young people). We have also pencilled in for February the Quarterly Performance and Resources Report, Pupil Attainment (I requested that this pay special attention to disadvantaged pupils) and the Families First Programme. If any of these areas are of special interest to you then please feel free to come along and watch, or watch online via the WSCC webcast on our website.

If you have previously been in contact with the Public Right of Way team at WSCC using their email address, please note the email address has now closed and all inquiries should be directed to the online PROW form on the WSCC website, which is the same mechanism as reporting a pothole. Anything more complex than an obstruction, missing signpost or damaged gate will have to go via myself.

In my role as the representative governor on the board for the University Hospitals Sussex Trust, I am deeply disturbed by the report that was released by the Human Tissue Agency (HTA) when they inspected Worthing Hospital's Mortuary, this is the main hub mortuary that also oversees St Richard's Mortuary and is the only one in the trust's system that's allowed to perform a post-mortem autopsy. The report found a large number of unacceptable failings from security to record keeping to maintenance by the trust, its leadership and its staff.

I have referred the report to the Health and Adult Services Scrutiny Committee to provide further scrutiny and made sure Jess Brown-Fuller MP is aware. I strongly recommend that people read the full report. [Worthing Hospital | Human Tissue Authority](#)

If you have been in the city recently you will have noticed that the works by county council contractors on installing phone signal infrastructure in the city centre has begun, it's expected to be finished before the new year, finally bringing signal to the city centre (now I just need to work out how to get signal to the villages).

In what will hopefully be the end of the saga of the Murray statue, the city council has managed to find a private donor who has offered to pay for the statue to be cast in bronze, so the current resin one can be taken down as planned, it has been sold to a private collector and the money raised from the sale has been ringfenced for investment in the arts. The new bronze one will be erected as part of the works on North and East Street next year. The City Council has also found a contractor to undertake restoration works on the market cross, which is in a poor condition, particularly the roof.

Highways have released their annual report for the 2025/26 year, they repaired a record 32,840 potholes. As we enter into the busy season for potholes, please make sure to report potholes on the WSCC website as and when you find them. The full report is available in the press release at the bottom of this report.

The odyssey of LGR continues, the government has now put it all on hold. This was very unhelpfully released to the press before the council leaders I don't understand who at Westminster thought that was a good way to treat their partners, but it is deeply infuriating. We don't know whether it's going ahead or what our boundaries will look like. I genuinely have no clue what's going on, and I don't think anyone does. This is infuriating for the uncertainty that it causes our staff at County Council (and likely at District as well), who will spend an unknown amount of time without an idea where they'll be working. We need stability to maintain our workforce, and we simply can't provide that at present and it's due to no fault of our own. We don't have a date a decision will be made any longer and we don't know why they've decided to pause it for review. This means that as things stand (for now) the district council elections will go ahead next year and the unitary council elections will not until the year after when the mayoral election is meant to happen (we haven't heard anything about that being delayed). The government has confirmed that it was the judicial reviews that caused the pause on LGR and withdrawal of four of the options, either due to embarrassment of the documents that could have come out, or that they would have lost the review. Our

CEO suggested to councillors that the issue was probably due to miscommunication between the civil servants and the ministers on the ministers' intentions. He also noted that the model most in-keeping with the other areas under LGR plans is the ridiculous Brighton Five Unitary model, which would see us combined with Horsham and Crawley (a not terrible position for us), and Mid Sussex returning to East Sussex (where it had been until the 1974 reorganisation) to merge with most of Wealden and Lewes. Arun, Worthing and Adur would merge as well.

We don't have a date for when we expect a decision to be made, and judging by past behaviour we won't find out until it's made public. This month is the last possible date that they can announce a decision in time for the May elections, we believe this to be very unlikely, but it remains a vague possibility. The government has written to us and confirmed that they remain committed to LGR, so we are continuing to undertake the work that we are able to while we wait. I remain staunchly opposed to one unitary for West Sussex as I believe it will be undemocratic, too distant, too cumbersome, too bureaucratic and risk burn out of councillors who are not retired or independently wealthy, making it hard for working councillors to represent the communities we live in.

We have rolled out a number of initiatives recently, the one closest to my heart is the West Sussex Care Guide and the associated support surrounding it. My own Nan recently entered a home, so I know it's a very difficult transition to make, meanwhile my other grandmother has a live in carer as her dementia worsens. The Guide includes the new Planning for Your Future webpage and information booklet, which my colleague Cllr Richard Bates (LD – Chi West) is leading on as the cabinet member for Adult Services. If you are thinking about your care needs, or you have a family member who is in the process then I would recommend looking at the booklet to help make a more informed decision and avoid nasty surprises. This is not just about care homes, but also about maintaining your independence for as long as possible in your own home, fall prevention and a checklist of what you need to know to make the preparations as early as possible.
